- Mrs. Chamberlain tell how George Washington met Martha, and then became general of the Continental Army during the American Revolution.
- Thomas Jefferson's daughter tell how her mother, Martha, died before her father became president, and what her father thought were the greatest of his many achievements.
- A vivacious little girl describe the heroism of James Madison's wife, Dolley, on the day the British burned the President's House during the War of 1812.
- A cranky servant tell the story of how James and Elizabeth Monroe saved Madame de Lafayette from the guillotine during the French Revolution.
- Why William Henry Harrison died after only one month as president.
- A singer of sea chanteys reminisce about how the explosion of the canon, Peacemaker, contributed to John Tyler's becoming the first president to marry while in office.
- A tourist to Washington, D.C., viewing Zachary Taylor's stuffed war horse on the White House lawn.
- And last, you'll see how Woodrow Wilson's second wife, Edith, became known as the First Lady President after World War I.
